

Praying the Nines Lenten Prayer Book

The Season of Lent

In the Season of Lent (the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter [excluding Sundays]), we reflect on Christ's ministry, death, and resurrection. We slow down, take time, and examine our internal spiritual lives and the way we live out our Christian faith in the world around us. Rather than give something up for Lent, like chocolate or coffee, the Prayer Ministry of the Congregational Care Committee suggests that, together, we take on the spiritual discipline of praying daily with, and for, each other and our community at 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. (Praying on the Nines) (or another time if that works better for you and your family). The idea is that our GPC family of faith is all praying to God together at some time during each day.

During Lent, we also remember that we are elemental creatures made of dust, and so we pray for strength for this journey that we embark upon together.

Please pick up the weekly Praying on the Nines prayer in the Narthex, each Sunday, either before or after worship. To get us started, here is ...

A Prayer for the Beginning of Lent

God of the journey who calls us to travel with faith, who reminds us we are dust yet breathes into us the breath of life, hear our prayer.

Bearer of the Sun, draw us into your heart of fire, that we may have light to uncover the unremembered stories and strength to endure their telling.

Helper who breathes life into each new generation, surround us with the winds of your spirit, and may we hear with tenderness the stories that they bear.

Fourth Week in Lent (John 9:1-41)

May we be the good stewards you call us to be, caring for it tenderly through our works to restore, recycle, and reuse all that we can.

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Fifth Week in Lent



Christ our Savior, you call us by name, leading us from death into eternal life. Awaken and unbind us by your Word, so that we may live and grow in faith, sharing your saving love with others; for you are the resurrection and the life. This week we pray together for your devoted disciples, carrying the good news of your gospel message into all corners of our community, our state, our country, and your world. May we be among them, caring for the least, visiting the imprisoned, binding up the brokenhearted, healing the sick, feeding the hungry. And, as we move from the exuberance of Palm Sunday, through Holy Week, that culminates in the darkness of Good Friday, preparing us for the joy of Easter Sunday, may everyone know we are your disciples – your followers - by our love. May it be so, we pray together in your name, Lord Jesus, and say Amen.
